I would like to give my very deep thanks to the Friends of Canon Lee who ran an absolutely brilliant Christmas Fayre, this really started our Christmas Spirit and raised over £1200.

Sporting Successes since the last Newsletter

Uniform Reminders—3rd January

When we return after Christmas we open as a new Academy. This is a significant milestone VALE OF in the history of the school and parents will see a number of important changes as we move ahead, the most obvious of these is a change in uniform and signage around school.



Your children have already given in their blazers, thank you. On the first day back all children will collect new uniform from the Hall. Slip-overs and ties can be worn immediately upon receipt, girls will be expected to wear their kilt if they have opted for one from the 4th January. Please follow the instructions below to ensure your child is fully compliant on 3rd January:

Key Stage focus

As we approach the end of the first term, our students have been reflecting on progress so far. With the end of a term comes the inevitable assessment period within many of the subjects we teach. Students reflect upon their progress so far, and work with their teacher to identify next steps and ways to improve. Our year 7 students in particular, can reflect upon their journey from primary to secondary—what has gone well? How can I be a better student? We hope this period of reflection will ensure they hit the ground running on their return to school after Christmas.

Year 11 have had an intensive term, and the mock results day had the desired effect for all the students. They are now ready for the challenges ahead with the help of extra classes or targeted interventions or just continued hard work and determination. Some students now realise that now is a time for change, reflection on what they have achieved and what they need to do to reach their goals. The enrichment day with the 6th Form Colleges helped them focus on their next steps and goals as well as how to write a personal statement and complete a successful application form. Next term will be the term that makes the difference, and as controlled assessments and courses are completed the year 11's will be focusing their energies on exam preparation. We will be communicating interventions with parents and asking for support with these extended days as it can only benefit students outcomes in August.

Year 10 have had their first assessments for their GCSE courses, and their teachers are planning challenging homework to test their understanding. Homework deadlines in Year 10 have been an issue for some and we welcome parental support with this. Mr Stancliffe and I will be looking at students who need extra support or intervention now in year 10 to help them reach their target grades. The trip to York University was very successful and gave year 10's the opportunity to see what the future may hold for them if they work hard and achieve their goals.

Partnership News Bringing the community together

It's been a busy half term for our young people and the community. In early November, Mr Orr and Gav from the RAF did a tour of the primary schools putting the Year 5's through their paces with a range of team work exercises.

Team Extreme, our resident horticultural club, travelled to Harrogate Pavilions to present their green space design for Kingsway North at the Green Plan It Challenge. Although not victorious, they did us proud and the experts commented on their superb presentation skills.

CLIC, our student community group, were recently nominated and in fact won the Community Champions Award at the Lord Mayor of York Shine Awards. In an evening filled with young people's achievements, their hard work and commitment was recognised and this is fully deserved.

The Christmas Fayre organised by the Friends of Canon Lee was a huge success. With many festive stalls and competitions, the Friends managed to raise a lot of money that will be put back into schools for projects involving our young people.

As part of the Christmas Fayre, Mr Orr ran a business enterprise competition for the primary schools. Three teams, Swag Santas, Christmas Devils and Money Magicians all had a stall with one aim—to make as much profit as possible! They were absolute stars and we look forward to seeing them again soon.

Mr Wilson did a superb job of organising a Christmas dinner event, where students were able to invite their parents and grandparents in to school for a festive feast. Mrs Shipley and the kitchen team did an incredible job, as they do daily, in providing delicious food that everyone enjoyed.

We had the pleasure of hosting the Quadkids Athletics competition this half term also. We had over one hundred primary students from all over the city come and compete, with supervision and support from our excellent Year 8 Leaders.



With the school soon to become The Vale of York, Academy we have also had a re-launch of the Student Council. Students across the school applied to be their form's rep and elections took place. We're delighted we have a very strong team ready and raring to go in 2017! In addition to the new Student Council, there are plans being drawn up for a fresh new approach to the House system within the school including house name changes, a new rewards structure and a competition calendar. Enrichment day 1—what a success-see what Year 7 to Year 9 got up to!

So why do we run enrichment days? It gives us chance to move beyond the constraints of the curriculum, and allow our students to explore issues around safety, health and relationships, team building, British Values, and careers. It allows us to take a break from the demands of our subject specialisms and see our students in a completely different light.

Year 7 were team building with STEM ambassadors—who could build the biggest tetrahedron? Dr Annie Hodgson from the University of York brought her chemistry showcase—and many of our year 7 students were actually able to take part in some of her amazing experiments!

Year 8 were 'Staying Safe' - learning about the hazards of rail, road and fire safety. Network Rail gave our students some hard-hitting facts about the consequences of playing near live tracks. Alive! focused on road and cycling safety, and delivered a set of 3 fantastic workshops where our students were given loads of amazing freebies to keep them safe on the streets—bike lights, hazard clothing and other awesome gadgets! We had some fire safety strategies from North Yorkshire Fire and Rescue, and St John's Ambulance showed our students how to carry out basic first aid, and teach them what to do in the event of a choking accident.
