All students have had extended assemblies this week to ensure they understand the new protocols and parents will see pupils have a new planner when they return to school after Easter.

#### THE YORK ISSP CONFERENCE FOR KS3

A number of Year 7 and 8 students attended the 'Codes and Ciphers' talk organised by York ISSP (Independent State School Partnership) on Monday 27th March. This was the latest lecture in a series by high profile speakers, aimed to inspire the most able and interested students in York. The talk was led by Thomas Briggs from Bletchley Park. He described the encryption methods used throughout history, in particular the role of Bletchley Park during the Second World War. He also explained some of the mathematics behind making ciphers more secure. The highlight was the demonstration of a real, working, World War II Enigma machine, used by Nazi Germany to send messages in secret. Ellis Ismail (Year 8) was lucky enough to be involved in the demonstration and try some codebreaking of his own!
