## **Key Stage focus**

Key stage 3

The Vale of York Academy is proud to be part of York Independent State School Partnership (ISSP). York ISSP provides academic challenge through opportunities which schools cannot provide alone. Their events are designed to push York's most able and interested students through engaging and stimulating activities. Since 2008, students from the school have participated in a range of events that have enhanced their learning in a fun, but challenging way. Over the next few

months, there are many more opportunities for Vale of York students to participate in.

Following the success of last year's summer school, there are two new summer schools this year for Years 7-8 and Years 9-10. The summer school will be held at Manor CE Academy from Monday 31<sup>st</sup> July to Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> August. Students will attend an extended masterclass studying one subject (of their choice) over the four days.

The Year 9 Brathay Residential will also take place from 1<sup>st</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> November 2017. ## BEHAVIOUR UPDATE: FIDGIT GADGETS

We are banning all students from using fidget spinners in school as we consider them a health and safety risk. ALL spinners will be banned from site; any student using one in class or around school will have

them confiscated and a comment placed in their planner.



Whilst we appreciate that the fidget gadgets can bring relief to anxiety for some students who have a specific medical need, we are concerned with the disruption that these items are bringing to students within the classroom, and that students are using them as a distraction rather than a concentration aid.

As a result, we have made the decision to ban fidget gadgets (such as the fidget ball or cube) within the classroom, unless the student has a specific medical need, such as ADHD diagnosed by a medical professional. These students within school will have a sticker in their planner signed by the SENCO, Pastoral and Welfare Manager or Vice Principal Welfare, which will allow them use of these in specific situations within the classroom.

Any other student using these gadgets within the classroom will have them confiscated and a behaviour comment placed in their planner.

#### AN OPPORTUNITY OF A LIFETIME ... MOROCCO 2019

Year 8 and 9 students have been invited to sign up for a lifetime experience in Morocco during the summer of 2019. The Academy has teamed up with Outlook Expeditions to take students to Morocco for 2 weeks, sampling the culture of a vibrant African country.

Students had an assembly the first week back after half term, informing them of this opportunity, followed by a parents' evening which was held in the library to cover the finer details of the experience.

This trip is like no other. As such, part of the experience is for students to fundraise the £1795.00 to get themselves to Morocco. Not all of the money has to be raised, but the emphasis is that all students have access to this opportunity and they will appreciate the trip so much more by raising the funds in this way.

Morocco is an amazing place and students are able to tailor their experience so they complete as much as they want while away. Mr Rampling will be heading up the staff team in Morocco and at present, there have been between 25-30 students keen to participate.

# <u>An idea of the itinerary for the trip is below (students will be able to put their own spin on this)</u>

<u>**1-2 days**</u> Acclimating with the country and spending time in Marrakech.

<u>3-4 days</u>—Attempt an amazing trek up Mount Jebel Toubkal (the highest peak in North Africa!)

<u>**4 days**</u> Support with a Conservation/Volunteering project in an African school .

<u>**2 days**</u> Rest and relaxation, sampling Camel treks and Moroccan coastlines.

#### Changes to the School Day from September 2017

The practicalities of this mean that for 4 hours each queries. week (two blocks of two hours) some pupils will be travelling to Manor School for their lessons and in return some will be coming to Vale of York. To allow this to happen, it has been essential to line up part of every school day with the timings at Manor School. It was agreed that this would be period 1 and 2 each day, thus requiring period 1 to start at 9.00 a.m., a fifteen minute delay to the current structure.

Since a change was already essential, the school saw this as an opportunity to consider the structure of the school day as a whole. As the school grows, the demands placed upon our Dining Hall and also the lack of indoor space available when cold or wet meant the school staff and student council wanted to consider how lunch could be taken. Equally, the introduction of the Positive Discipline programme requires greater tutor input and we have also given consideration to the amount of tutor time each day.

The new format allows us to make changes to all of these things and ensure we have the most productive learning environment possible. Whilst lunch itself is shorter, there will be less students to serve. There will be no PE classes taught over lunch
