# Message from the Principal

This half term has flown by, with many successful and memorable events taking place that you shall read about in this edition. Students at Vale continue to be busy; with Year 7 enjoying the recent STEM experience, Morocco preparations ongoing, and Year 11 entering their second round of mock examinations.

Our work with the community goes from strength, with two hundred Year 5 pupils attending our science showcase and our VOYAGE programme continuing to offer bespoke opportunities for some of our more able. The Staff and Community Quiz Night held this month was a great success and very enjoyable; funds raised by the Vale of York Society make valuable

contributions to support our students in a number of ways, and I am very grateful for the work they do. Rightly, the reputation of the Academy is improving, and the number of parental preferences made for September 2019 is the highest yet. We now expect to recruit 150 pupils into Year 7 later this year.

The academy benefits from being a member of Hope Learning Trust in many ways. The opportunity to recruit newly qualified teachers through the Ebor Hope Teaching School is a real advantage. We have already recruited specialist teachers to several subject areas ready for September and I look forward to introducing you to them later in the year. I also would like to mention the Independent State Schools
Partnership (ISSP), of which we are a member alongside most of the York state secondary schools, The Mount, St Peter's and Bootham School. # BAE Systems Education Roadshow 2019

Year 7 enjoyed a visit from The BAE Systems Education Programme Roadshow - delivered in partnership with the RAF and the Royal Navy, celebrating all things STEM. Pupils were able to watch an inspiring performance entitled "Are you talking to me?" which looked into how mobile phones connect people around the World, how computers communicate with each other in the modern world, and how we interact with our devices such as Bluetooth technology. Students were introduced to the real-life application of some of the most recent communication technologies within BAE Systems, the RAF and the Royal Navy. We look forward to hosting this team again in 2020.

# Try a new club this term

# Year 8 Carbon Footprint Manifesto

Top set year 8 scientists were set homework to pitch their own manifesto for the Prime Minister explaining how we would cut down carbon emissions, reduce global warming, and protect our atmosphere.

After having introduced their ideas, the class debated and eventually chose the top five ideas to pitch to the Government.

- Smart timers all houses to have smart timers fitted for appliances, which charge items and once charged will turn off to save power.
- Zero waste policy all things have to be recycled, all companies must produce packaging that is renewable or biodegradable, for example seaweed or potato starch packaging.
- Cut down on carbon fuel grow more crops for burning to reduce the amount of carbon fuel needed.
- 4) Plant more trees for every tree cut down, a further two trees should be planted. The size of land would determine how many trees and plants you should have grown.
- 5) Capture CO2 emissions this is dehydrated in to a liquid then put in to rocks and dissolved.

Mr Rampling was impressed with the huge amount of ideas the class came up with and after much debating, the class had reflected on which strategies would be most effective, both in terms of cost and time. Mr Rampling said that it was fantastic to hear such well-considered thoughts and ideas, and to see how engaged everyone was in this important problem-solving task. It is encouraging to know that these are the young people who will turn into the leaders of tomorrow.

## York ISSP opportunities

York ISSP is a partnership between twelve schools in York. It provides opportunities that schools cannot provide alone, designed to challenge York's most able and interested students. Students from Year 7 to Year 11 have been involved in a range of exciting York ISSP events so far this year.

During October half term, three Year 9 students went on a residential trip run by the Brathay Trust in Cumbria, taking part in masterclasses and adventurous outdoor activities. In November, a group of Year 7 students visited St Peter's School to debate which was the most important 'breakthrough moment' in history.

There was an archaeology lecture on the 'superpowers' needed for archaeologists to rediscover the lives of past societies. In January, Year 7 and Year 8 students attended a lecture by Damien Cruden, artistic director of York Theatre Royal. He explained how the Theatre brings York's stories to life and the role it plays in the community.



Some Year 8 students have joined the Maths Excellence Club and are tackling tricky mathematical puzzles, supported by undergraduate students from the University of York. Year 9 ISSP students have joined a new debating club, learning new skills and holding debating events with students from across York. GCSE Latin and Astronomy classes have also continued this year.

This year has seen the launch of York ISSP's online journal, *Insightful Imaginings*. The aim of the journal is to

publish fantastic work produced by York students. This includes work produced in school, at home or at an ISSP event. The work can be fiction, non-fiction, poetry, artwork, scientific research, maths puzzles etc. Please see the website for more details:
