Planning your future Post-16 – guide for parents, carers and young people

All young people in Year 11 will soon begin to identify options for their continuing participation in education and training in the autumn of 2021. Current regulations mean that they will participate in some form of education or training until at least their 18th birthday. The majority will continue throughout Year 13 and beyond.

Young people in this city have a wide choice of options and our institutions provide post-16 education that is amongst the best in the country. At this stage, it is important that young people and their parents/carers are aware of all the options available, how they can be accessed and where further information and support can be found – staying in education and training does not necessarily mean staying in school.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, most Year 11 students were not able to attend school from the end of March to the end of the summer term. Added to this, at the time of writing, arrangements for GCSE and other examinations in 2021 have not yet been confirmed, although a three week delay to the usual timetable has been announced. This means that our young people find themselves in an uncertain situation – we want to support them through this difficult period as well as possible so that they can progress successfully to their next stage.
