

Challenged to be their very best

We are committed to ensuring that all our students fulfil their potential, are well prepared for adult life and the world of work and are able to make a positive and sustained contribution to the society in which they live.

DYNAMIC CURRICULUM

We offer a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum which is dynamic and strives to meet the needs of all our students, regardless of ability. We use a variety of pathways to support and develop all our students. We believe that learning should be stimulating and enjoyable; staff employ a wide range of teaching strategies to accommodate the interests and needs of individual students, enabling every student to have fun and experience success. The progress of students is constantly monitored to ensure continued high standards of achievement and high expectations in terms of the quality of work produced.

A FULL RANGE OF **OPPORTUNITIES**

Our curriculum aim is to challenge, support, and enthuse all our students. This is encapsulated in the school motto 'always giving the best' and reflected through the curriculum provision we offer. During Key Stage 3, students

study 15 different subjects:



For able, gifted and talented students there are extra opportunities within and beyond the curriculum

English, Mathematics, Science, French, Geography, History, Physical Education, Religious Education, World Views Modern Issues (Citizenship), Computer Science, Art, Design Technology, Drama, Food and Nutrition and Music. Your child will be engaged in not only developing a greater knowledge and understanding in each subject but crucially learning and mastering the key skills to prepare them for the challenges of exam-based subjects. In Key Stage 4, students will study 10 different subjects, so in conjunction with core subjects, students will choose four option subjects from an offer of over 24 different courses. Courses such as Business Studies, Media Studies, Engineering, German, Psychology, Health and Social Care, Textiles and Sport Science can also be studied in Key Stage 4. Being part of a large Trust allows our staff to work with

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other subject specialists across the region to develop and evolve the best curriculum for our students.

SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD

Students can access additional support through specialist teaching and a dedicated team of teaching assistants who focus on developing basic skills such as literacy, numeracy and science. For able, gifted and talented students there are extra opportunities within and beyond the curriculum including History of Art, Astronomy and Latin at St Peter's School. For the most able mathematicians the ability to undertake Further Maths as a twilight session is also possible.

POST-16 EDUCATION

At all stages, the curriculum carefully considers progression routes and ensures close links with both our primary partner schools and post-16 providers to support and enhance transition arrangements. Our students leave with the confidence and maturity for the next stage in their lives and we are delighted that they choose to build on their successes by moving on to post-16 providers within the city. The school has forged strong partnerships with York College, Askham Bryan College, local sixth forms and the city's two universities, to support these moves and ensure that students continue to succeed academically and socially when they have left our care.

Supported to be their very best

The welfare of our students is at the centre of everything we do, supported by the excellent professional relationships developed between staff and students.

ACCESSIBLE SUPPORT

Students are supported throughout the school day by Progress Leaders and a dedicated team of form tutors. The team provide a visible and accessible presence and are often the first port of call for both students and their parents to discuss any concerns, should the need arise.

Tutors are able to respond to the needs of individual students enabling them to flourish, both academically and socially during their time in school.

HIGH STANDARDS

We have very high expectations of all our students in every area of school life, including uniform and behaviour, and this leads to a caring yet ordered community with an atmosphere of purposeful learning. Students are encouraged to take responsibility for their own actions and are treated as individuals. We recognise and celebrate their different abilities,

aptitudes and interests at every opportunity. Student leaders, elected from Year 10, represent the school at events and work closely with younger pupils, supporting our reading programme in Year 7 and assisting in tutor time and mentoring pupils in their free time.

MAKING THE MOVE FROM PRIMARY SCHOOL

Transition arrangements from Year 6 to Year 7 are very important to us. We have close relationships with our feeder primary schools and all children are visited in their primary setting before they join us in September. We offer a programme of master classes and transition events for Years 5 and 6 throughout the year. Year 6 also enjoy visits to school before starting in September so they are familiar with many staff and the school environment.

KEEPING IN TOUCH

We strive to develop close relationships with parents and carers and encourage them to take a close interest in the progress of their children through regular communications





with school, including parents' evenings, Senior Leadership Team (SLT) drop-in sessions, interim and yearly reports and more informally through our various Twitter accounts.

We also encourage electronic communication and regularly use text and email to ensure parents are fully informed and supportive of the work of the school and are best able to support the individual needs of students to achieve the best possible learning outcomes and successes for them. We firmly believe that we grow stronger together and our aim is to always to put people and partnerships with home first.

Our school is an exciting place to learn. It creates opportunities to broaden the range of courses and experiences available to our students to help build confidence and self-esteem and develop their imagination.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR ALL

We encourage students to discover and develop their talents, whatever they may be, and we provide a wide range of opportunities for all including European Day of Languages, World Book Day, Readathon and UK Maths Challenge, alongside poetry workshops, school productions, community days and sporting opportunities.

Many activities take place at the end of the school day and students can take advantage of a vast array of extra-curricular clubs, such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award and homework club, alongside a wide range of more traditional sporting activities.

BROADENING HORIZONS

The school has a well-established programme of visits both within the UK and abroad, including trips to various parts of Europe. Our partnership with the Hope Sentamu Learning Trust

has widened these opportunities further. We organise a number of overseas residentials; each Year 7 child is supported to attend an Outdoor Education trip to Lakeside to support integration; and we are now reintroducing a series of overseas trips for languages and sport.

An extensive programme of community activities support our school-based provision. Students have the opportunity to work with York St John University through our Green Apples scheme, study Latin and Astrology via the York Independent State School Partnership (YISSP), perform at the city's Dance Festival and participate in numerous enterprise challenges and work experience through the North Yorkshire Business and Education Partnership.

INVESTING IN THE COMMUNITY

The school community also benefits from continued investments in school facilities which offer some of the most advanced technology for studying and working including a multi-media room, alongside our full-size floodlit all weather pitch and the 'Cube', a specialist drama space.



Students can take advantage of a vast array of extracurricular clubs and sports such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award. gardening, electronics and drama clubs.

In all year groups, students are encouraged to take on responsibilities and develop their leadership skills by acting as peer mentors, and junior leadership team representatives. Students in Year 10 are elected each year as prefects and our Head Students meet with prospective students and their parents or carers at Open Evening. They are our proudest ambassadors.

We believe that the most effective way of motivating students is by celebrating their achievements. Students draw great pride from each other's successes in weekly assemblies and through more formal occasions, such as our annual prize giving evening where awards are presented for attainment, effort and sustained contributions to the wider school life.

THE INTENT OF OUR CURRICULUM

Here at Vale of York our intent is straightforward - we endeavour to enable all our learners to live the school motto of "Always giving the best" into action. To achieve this, we offer the best curriculum possible, ensuring that it provides the breadth and opportunity for all learners to be continually challenged and inspired.



CURRICULUM DESIGN

Our ambitious and extensive curriculum is designed so that within Key Stage 3 their learning journey at Vale of York, students will have the opportunity to learn and develop knowledge, skills and understanding in fifteen different subjects. This broad experience in Key Stage 3 prepares and informs our students, ensuring they progress on to the most appropriate academic pathway as they start to consider their futures.

Students in Key Stage 4 follow a selected pathway, focusing on mastering key skills and core concepts within each subject area. During this year, they also seek to gain the essential subject specific skill base that undoubtedly facilitates effective learning.

Our curriculum leaders are passionate about their subjects and want to instil a similar desire within our students. However, each leader looks

beyond the need to simply impart knowledge. Throughout the curriculum, opportunities are created to ensure our students build character and become a responsible citizen in the community in which they live.

TAILORING A BESPOKE CURRICULUM

Every pupil is an individual and as such needs a curriculum that provides them with the necessary components not only to succeed and achieve, but crucially open the doors of opportunity once they leave.

At Key Stage 3, most teaching is delivered in mixed ability groups with setting in some subjects. As students progress on to examination courses, some subjects retain mixed ability groups whereas other subjects move to setting.

Literacy and numeracy support is an integral part of some students' timetables, with

academic progress being reviewed on a regular basis. For those students who need additional support, appropriate intervention packages are put in place.

At Key Stage 4, students take responsibility for shaping their learning, and the academy provides four different pathways for students to follow through to examination: Enhanced, Standard, Supported and Tailored.

Across all five years of education at Vale of York Academy, the appropriate level of careers information, advice and guidance is delivered through the PSHE curriculum and various enrichment activities. We're proud to have been awarded the national Quality in Careers Standard by Prospects.

Our commitment to a tailored curriculum is exemplified by our able, gifted and talented programme and SEND provision. This ensures that learners feel supported and



challenged so that they can fulfil their own potential.

Crucially, we keep an eye on meeting the national skills gaps and local employment needs. We are constantly reviewing opportunities within our curriculum offer so that we can provide our learners with the most appropriate courses and experience, with extra prospects of successfully continuing into further education, training or employment.

WHAT TO EXPECT

SCHOOL LIFE

Prior to joining school, your child will hopefully have taken some of the opportunities to visit us. Our prefects and Head Students will visit your child's school on a number of occasions along with key staff, to build relationships, answer questions and provide peace of mind.

In July of Year 6, your son or daughter will visit Vale of York Academy at least twice to take part in induction activities and to start to form relationships with new friends and staff. As a parent you will be invited to the school to meet your child's tutor, buy uniform and formally register.

On joining school, your child will be placed into a tutor group

at least one other nominated friend from their primary school. They will be taught in broadly banded groups for English, Drama, History, Geography, and Science and RE. They are taught in sets for French and Mathematics and as mixed ability, mixed form groups for technology subjects - Art, ICT, Music, Product Design, Food, Textiles and PE. Your child will be issued a planner in which they will store their daily timetable and homework and staff will use this to communicate directly with you. In turn this will be your first port of call should

> you wish to contact school. Each day your child will be able to buy lunch using a fingerprint system which you can top up from home or they can bring a packed lunch. After school there are a multitude of sporting activities and other clubs, including a homework club in which your son or daughter can take part for an hour.

> Each term you will receive a written report about your child's

progress and as a Year 7 parent you will be able to attend two parents' evenings throughout the year. Each half-term we will hold a drop-in which you are free to attend to have direct conversations with senior leaders.

HOMEWORK

Homework is an essential part of every child's working week. It develops the skills of independent learning, selfsufficiency and determination.

Homework will consolidate skills learned, or prepare students for their next lessons or support revision. It often provides the opportunity for the child to spend extended time on their learning and dig deeper into broader contexts. It will be set daily as per the homework timetable. Each child records homework in their planner and this will be checked by the form tutor weekly. Homework is also posted on Google Classroom. Increasingly, our Google platform is used for consolidation of learning.

To help ensure our new Year 7 students have a smooth transition from primary school, the Vale of York Academy school day is structured to allow for a three-way split lunch session.

Accommodated by the flexibility around Lesson 4, this innovative approach allows similarly aged children and established friendship groups to share lunch at different times.



We are delighted to welcome all students within our immediate catchment and those from beyond.


Admissions

The school has a designated catchment area defined by the Local Authority. City of York Council is committed to the principles of local schools for local people and all students living in this area are entitled to a place with us. We are delighted to welcome all students within our immediate catchment and those from beyond. Students outside this area and when the school is oversubscribed are allocated places according to the local authority criteria.

- **First priority:** pupils who are either currently or have previously been 'looked after'.
- Second priority: pupils who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school, with a sibling at the preferred school at the time of admission.
- **Third priority:** pupils who live within the catchment area normally served by the preferred school. • Fourth priority: pupils
- considered by the admissions authority to have exceptional social or medical needs which relate to the preferred school. **Fifth priority:** pupils with a
