

# **Grow** your career with an apprenticeship

in York



A local guide about apprenticeships for young people and parents or carers

### What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a job with training. You will work alongside experienced staff, gain job-specific skills, earn a wage and get holiday pay. This route often leads to permanent employment or university.

Apprentices are subject to normal employee terms and conditions. You would be employed for a minimum of 12 months and usually work and train for 37 hours per week. However they can be completed on a part time basis.

#### **Training**

An apprentice benefits from on-the-job training with the employer and off-the-job training with a training provider. The training provider delivers the theoretical side to the apprenticeship. This supports the skills, knowledge and behaviours you will be developing for that job role.

There are a number of ways of receiving training:

- Online and workplace learning with the training provider
- Day release at college, a training centre or university
- Block placements (e.g. one full week spent at college)

#### **Entry requirements**

Every apprenticeship has its own entry requirements. English and maths GCSEs are usually a minimum requirement for any level of apprenticeship. However it's about more than good grades; employers want candidates who are committed, motivated, enthusiastic and reliable.

## Benefits and prospects

#### Earn and learn

In the first year, apprentices must be paid at least the minimum apprentice wage of £4.30 per hour, however vacancies in York are offering on average £233 per week or £6.30 per hour\* (starting salary).

After 12 months, all apprentices must be paid at least minimum wage for their age.

Those who complete a higher apprenticeship earn, on average, £150,000 more over their lifetime than their peers who do not acheive a higher qualification—similar earnings to graduates.\*\*



#### **Future options**

The majority of apprentices (90%) will stay in employment, with 71% staying with the same employer.\*\*

#### **Employability**


Apprentices are trained in the skills that employers are looking for. They receive a minimum of one year's paid employment, gaining transferable skills which provide a great foundation for a future career.

## A choice of industries and employers

There are over **600** different apprenticeship standards covering most job roles.

As well as local businesses, many larger, national employers take on apprentices including the NHS, the BBC and HSBC.

## Higher and degree apprenticeships

Higher apprenticeships provide an opportunity to gain Level 4 qualifications or above which includes: higher national diploma, foundation degree bachelor's degree and master's degree. Typically, these apprenticeships take between one to five years to complete and involve part-time study at a college, university, or training provider.

In 2018/19, over 75,000 people

started a higher or degree apprenticeship in the UK and numbers

They are a great alternative to full-time university, however competition is tough - partly because there is a limited number of vacancies, but also because apprentices don't pay for the training (saving up to £27,000 of student fees). They also receive a wage and a contract of employment.

Entry requirements usually include at least five GCSEs grades 9-4 or A\*-C (including English and maths), as well as a Level 3 qualification such as A level, NVQ, or BTEC. Some employers require applicants to have studied subjects relevant to the apprenticeship.

#### **Developments in York**

City of York Council is working with employers, training providers and higher education institutions to grow higher and degree apprenticeships in the city. However as vacancies are still limited, you may want to expand your search area to include travel-to-work areas such as Leeds.

#### Five top tips on applying:

- I. Have a genuine interest in the position you are applying for.
- 2. Read the job description carefully. Your answers to questions should link in with the key elements of the apprenticeship.
- 3. Do your research and demonstrate that you know about the company.
- 4. Tailor your answers to the job description. Use examples from work experience, school or college studies, volunteering or hobbies.
- 5. Ensure you use spell check and a sensible email address.
