Introduction

How to use this guide

Deciding what you want to do after year II can be both an exciting and stressful time. However there is plenty of support available to help you make decisions. You may find it helpful to share the information in this booklet with your parent or carer.

York has a wide range of high-quality choices available for all young people, at all levels. Whatever you are doing now, there is a pathway for you to follow in 2024-25.

This booklet gives initial information and tells you where to find out more. It has been designed with all students in mind, with the sections in blue containing additional information for students with an existing **Education**, **Health and Care Plan (EHCP)**.

How to use this guide if you have an EHCP

If you have an EHCP, you also need to look for sections that have a blue background and the pink symbol.

You can check if you have an EHCP by asking your teacher, parent, carer or someone who supports you.



Participation in education and training after year II

Current legislation sets out an aspiration that you will continue in education or training until at least your 18th birthday (throughout Year 12 and into Year 13). This will allow you to gain skills and qualifications that help you to progress to higher education, work and adult life; enabling you to succeed in the fast changing, modern world.

It is very important that all young people are able to access education or training. Schools work with the Local Authority (City of York Council) to guarantee that every school leaver will have an appropriate offer of education/training by the end of September after they finish Year 11.

If you have not been accepted on to a full-time course, or in employment with training, don't worry. There are some shorter programmes available, that you can join at other times in the year, to help you progress into full-time education, or employment with training (see pages 19-21).

Whatever you are thinking of doing, it's important to look at all the options. Information on how to apply is available on school, college and provider websites or in their brochures (often called a 'prospectus'). When you have decided on your preferred pathway, you can make applications to post-16 providers such as sixth forms, colleges, apprenticeship employers or providers. Your school will be able to provide you with further information.

Helping you to decide

This is an important time in your life and there are many options to consider. When making choices, it's important to have the right information to make an informed decision. Taking the time now could improve your motivation and provide the foundation for positive results next year and beyond. Take the time to:

- Find out information about different routes (often referred to as 'pathways') from events, websites and literature.
- Make sure you have the opportunity to attend taster days (see page 38) with post-16 providers. This is especially important if you are considering taking up a subject you have not studied at GCSE.
- Ensure that you understand the different qualifications, levels and pathways available (see pages 8-23).
- Talk to your teachers about the Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance programme in your school which can support you to make successful choices.
- Have a chat with your parents/carers about what you enjoy, what you are good at, what motivates you to learn, the environment you want to be in and your own learning style.
- Think independently about your choice, not about what your friends are doing.

If you have Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities

If you have Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities (SEND), your focus may not just be on education or training but may cover the broader aspects of preparing for adult life.

Your learning could become more vocational (education or training linked to a particular skill/trade), to help you identify opportunities for employment, and improve your communication, relationship and independent living skills.

To help you achieve your aspirations, most full-time college courses are 3 days per week and other learning programmes are usually 3 or 4 days, giving you time for activities outside of education.

SEND Support Plans are documents used with you if you have identified special educational needs and recieve SEND support in school. If you have a SEND Support Plan, this may help inform your education and employment with training choices.

Not all young people with SEND have or require a SEND Support Plan, but if you do need additional support, speak to student support at your education setting.



York SEND Local Offer

The York SEND Local offer is available on <u>yorksend.org</u>. It provides more information for young people with special educational needs, disabled youwng people, parents and carers.

If you have SEND it is realistic to think about paid work. Paid work can give you financial independence, help you to meet friends, and it's good for physical and mental health. It's never too early to start thinking about the best way to prepare for paid work – start by thinking about what you enjoy, your hopes, and the skills and qualifications you may need.

Later in this guide, there are details of additional education and employment with training opportunities for you if you have an EHCP. This includes:

Your Specialist Learning and Employment Adviser can provide information on the different career areas each provider covers and help you (with your parent or carer) to understand how they may be able to meet your individual needs.

You will also have opportunities to attend open events and taster sessions to support your decision making.



If you have an EHCP

If you have an existing EHCP the Preparation for Adulthood outcomes in your plan will help you to make decisions about your education, training and employment choices.

Your plan should:

- Describe you
- Describe your goals
- Describe your individual needs
- Set out what type of education or employment with training is best for you



Your plan is reviewed at least once a year to make sure the informationis up to date.

It is important that you try to take part in your plan review to help you plan your next steps towards training and employment.

Your SEN Caseworker is responsible for your EHCP and leads decision making around next steps. However, you will also have the support of a Specialist Learning and Employment Adviser, who can help you to prepare to make choices relating to education, training and employment.

An adviser will meet with you (in person or virtually) to find out about your skills, experience and employment ambitions. Your adviser then works with your SEN caseworker, family, teaching staff and others who know you (such as social workers and health professionals) to support your successful transition into adulthood.

Qualification Levels

The level of the programme that you will be able to start will depend on what qualifications you already have or are expecting to achieve by the time you move on from Year 11. GCSEs are graded using a numbered scale from 9 (high) to 1 (low).

Currently, if you are not awarded a GCSE at grade 4 (previously grade C) or higher in English or maths, those subjects will be included in your next course or training programme.

The information in this booklet applies to you if you are finishing year 11 in 2024 and moving into post-16 education or employment with training in September 2024.

Further Education

All courses below are classed as full time, made up of qualifications, tutorial, work experience and other support activities; however, this may not require attending classes five days a week.

AS/A Levels (Level 3)

These are the main routes into higher education, but they are also useful if you want to progress straight into employment or an apprenticeship. You choose 3 or 4 A Levels which are available in a wide range of subjects across the city. Courses tend to focus on academic study with subjects ranging from history, maths and sciences to more applied subjects such as business, media studies and information technology.

An AS Level is a totally separate qualification. You can take an AS Level exam after one year and achieve a qualification. AS Levels are only available locally at York College.

Applied General Qualifications or Tech Levels (Level 3)

If you are wishing to continue your education at an advanced level through applied learning, an Applied General Qualification (including BTECs and other Diplomas) could be right for you. They help you to develop transferable knowledge and skills and will meet entry requirements for a range of higher education courses. They can also enable entry to employment or an apprenticeship.

If you are wanting to specialise in a technical occupation or occupational group, Tech Levels equip you with specialist knowledge and skills, enabling entry to employment or an apprenticeship in that occupational area or progression to a related further or higher education course.

T Levels (Level 3)

T Levels were introduced in 2020 and are equivalent to three A Levels. They provide a mixture of classroom learning and an industry placement of at least 315 hours as a route into employment, further study or a higher apprenticeship.

York College T Level courses for September 2024 are Leadership & Management, Building Services Engineering for construction (Electrical Installation), Building Services Engineering for Construction (Plumbing), Construction Design, Surveying & Planning, Education & Early Years, Engineering & Manufacturing: Design & Development, Hair, Beauty & Barbering and Health. Locally Bishop Burton College also offer T Level provision and there is a daily bus service to and from York).

Institutes of Technology (Level 3 – 5)

Institutes of Technology (IoTs) are collaborations between further education (FE) providers, universities (HE) and employers.

IoTs deliver high quality, technical qualifications, such as HNCs, HNDs, apprenticeships, T Levels and foundation degrees, with a focus on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) subjects such as:

- Cyber Security
- Construction & Engineering

Other Vocational Qualifications (Levels I - 3)

On courses for other vocational qualifications (such as BTECs or NVQs) you would undertake practical, work-related tasks designed to develop the skills and knowledge to do a particular job effectively. You could gain these at college, while working, or during an apprenticeship (see pages 14-17).


The qualifications are assessed by a mix of practical assignments, building up a portfolio of evidence and exams. There is no fixed duration, but it usually takes one year to complete a qualification at Level 1 or 2. At Level 3, programmes are flexible and qualifications can be achieved at the end of both the first and second year.

Study Programmes

A study programmes include qualifications, work experience and life skills to help you get a job and live independently.

Foundation Learning (Entry level – Level I)

Foundation learning is an individual programme, to help you focus on your own specific needs, e.g. personal and social skills, confidence building, reading, writing and numeracy. Programmes include vocational learning and the duration depends on your individual needs, aims and goals.



Training Through Employment

Apprenticeships

An apprenticeship is a contracted, paid job with training. You work alongside experienced staff, gain job-specific skills, earn a wage and get holiday and other entitlements. You will follow an apprenticeship standard, which sets out the knowledge, skills and behaviours you will need to succeed in your job. For a searchable list of approved standards, visit the Institute for Apprenticeships.

Throughout your apprenticeship, you create a portfolio to evidence your developed knowledge, skills and behaviours, leading to exams and/or professional discussions (known as an End Point Assessment or EPA).

You are usually employed at least 30 hours per week for 15-27 months. Depending on the apprenticeship and employer, you could work part time and spread the training over a longer time period. The apprenticeship route often leads to progression in employment, a higher-level apprenticeship, or university.

Levels

Apprentices usually start at Level 2 or 3 (equivalent to GCSE or A Level) and could continue onto Level 4 or 5 (foundation degree level) and in some cases, up to Level 6 or 7 (bachelor's or master's degree level). English and maths GCSE passes, or functional skills level 2 are usually required for any level of apprenticeship, but not always at the start, meaning you would be supported to re-sit them alongside.

Apprenticeships can be well suited to people with a learning disability as they combine practical training with study and can be part-time if needed. An apprentice works alongside experienced staff in an organisation to gain job-specific skills. Inclusive Apprenticeships (also known as Supported Apprenticeships) are like any other apprenticeship, but with lower minimum English and maths requirements for people with an EHCP or who previously had a Statement of Educational need.

Training providers

Apprentices and employers are supported by a training provider, who deliver the skills, knowledge and behaviours required for the apprenticeship. These could be independent organisations, colleges or universities. There are several ways to receive training: day release at a college or training centre, block placements, or virtually with visits to your workplace by the training provider.

Financial Support

A 16-19 Bursary Fund and apprenticeship bursary for care leavers (up to the age of 25) may be available. This is dependent on your family circumstances. For more information see pages 32, 54, 56 and 60-61.

Applying

The main way to search and apply for vacancies is at: **GOV.UK**.

For construction vacancies, go to: <u>Talent View Construction</u>. For rail vacancies, go to: <u>Routes into Rail</u>.

Check which training providers deliver the apprenticeships you are interested in, and contact them direct for upcoming vacancies via GOV.UK Employers find apprenticeship training.

Approach employers directly with a CV and check their websites and social media throughout the year – as not all apprenticeship jobs are advertised on the websites above. Employers may not be considering an apprentice but might change their minds when presented with a great candidate.

I chose this route as it allows me to learn a trade while also getting a qualification


Although an apprentice wage can sometimes be lower initially, the **prospects** at the end are very good.

The key thing **employers are looking for** alongside your qualifications is **experience**. An apprenticeship gives you that.

Apply for several different positions that appeal to you, as you can often get a feel for a place during interviews and there is also a lot of competition for vacancies.

Do research and look at your options. It puts you a step ahead at a young age, earning a wage, gaining work experience and getting qualified.

Apprenticeships give you lots of **opportunities** and experience. The best thing about it is you get to earn while you learn.



Supported Employment

A personalised model for supporting people aged 18 years or older with significant disabilities to secure and retain paid employment. Eligible young people may progress from other programmes such as work experience, inclusive apprenticeships and Supported Internships.

You will get:

- Support to identify your aspirations, learning needs, skills, experiences and job preferences (with carer and support worker involvement)
- Support with practical job finding and job carving to ensure it suits your needs
- An induction in the workplace and ongoing training as well as out of work support if needed
- A development plan to record your goals
- Support with career development beyond the programme

Other Education Pathways and In-Year Provision

If you are not ready to start a course in September or find the course you have chosen is not right for you, other learning options may be available. Below are some examples of current in-year provision available locally (subject to change).



York College & University Centre

York College offers a variety of provision with start dates across the year. Entry requirements vary by the level of course, please contact info@yorkcollege.ac.uk for more information. Please also see the college entry on pages 51-52 of the Specialist Providers section).

September and October

Level 3 Extended Project Qualification: This involves working towards an Extended Project Qualification, NCFE Occupational Studies Qualification and developing academic skills supporting progression to university. (Requires a GCSE 4 or above in English language).

September and January

Level 2 Vocational Studies (Princes Trust): This Level 2 programme is based around employment, training and skills. The courses are designed to help with key employability skills development and self-confidence, whilst also focusing on English and maths if you have not secured a 4 or above at GCSE. (3 days a week).

September

Level I and 2 Vocational Studies (Princes Trust) onsite: These programmes are based around employment, training and personal development. The courses are designed to help with key employability skills development and self-confidence, whilst also focusing on English and maths if you have not secured a 4 or above at GCSE. (3 days a week). This will also be offered offsite at White Rose Football Club close to York College at Level 2.

Entry Level 2 – 3.5 Programmes

Entry level courses will help you develop a range of transferable skills. Units of study include horticulture and conservation, animal care and agriculture. You will study in college 3 days per week and there will be a mix of practical and theory sessions. There will also be an opportunity for group work experience.

Level I Pathways

Take your first steps on the career ladder and study a Level I Land-Based Programme. We focus on practical skills, but we will also develop your academic skills over the year. You will attend College for a minimum of 3 days per week and upon completion of your programme you will achieve a level I diploma in Land-Based Studies from City and Guilds. There are no formal exams, but you will collect a portfolio of evidence and be continually assessed during the course. Courses are offered in agriculture, animal care, horse care and horticulture. We will help you develop skills that employers are looking for and also improve your personal performance. 24 hours of work experience in a setting that is relevant to your qualification will add to your transferable skills.

Stepping Stone and Level 2 Pathways

We offer Level 2 Stepping Stone or full level 2 in Animal Care or Land-based Studies. After a year of study at level 1, many of our students progress onto level 2. This can be either in the mainstream section of the college or within the Foundation section. However, for those students who are not ready, we are able to offer a unique opportunity to study on our Stepping Stone Programme. You will study for a minimum of 3 days per week and you will be able to broaden your existing vocational skills, develop your ability to study independently, explore career routes within the industry and boost your confidence. You will undertake 75 – 150 hours of work experience in a setting that is relevant to your qualification. On completion you will be awarded a level 2 certificate in Land-based Studies.

Prince's Trust TEAM Programme (12 weeks, 3 start dates a year)

This programme challenges you to develop self-confidence, interpersonal and employability skills. It includes a one-week residential and a two-week work placement and gives you the chance to contribute through community projects. You will also get support to find work, become self-employed or progress to further study.

Flexible Learning Programme

This course runs from 8-12 weeks, 2 days a week, covering employability, health & safety, first aid, horticulture, animal care and horse care. Available around the Yorkshire region to anyone claiming work related benefits and is aged over 16.



Routes 2 Success

Routes 2 Success is a supportive full time study programme for you if you are aged 16-19, or up to 25 with an EHCP. It aims to build on your personal and academic skills, supporting your transition to further education, training or work. You can study English and maths from Entry Level Functional Skills to GCSEs alongside a City & Guilds qualification in employability skills, and also undertake a work placement. The programme may be right for you if you are not yet ready to access mainstream post-16 study and learn more effectively in a small group setting.

Additional Learning Options for Students with an EHCP

Supported Internships

If you are aged 16-24 with an Education Health and Care Plan, a supported internship can be a good way to develop your independence and it can even lead to a paid job. It is mainly based at the employer's workplace, where you learn on the job with support from a job coach and tutor. If you learn best by 'doing' and are ready to work but need extra support to take that step, a supported internship may be right for you.

A supported internship will last at least 6 months, but most are around 12 months long. Whilst you are not paid during the programme, you will benefit from being part of a real business and develop skills to help you secure paid employment.

Personalised Learning and Work Experience Programmes

These programmes focus on work experience and include a tailored package of learning which prepares you for employment (or volunteering) and independent living, building towards living a full adult life in York.

This pathway could be appropriate for you if you want to continue your education when you leave school in a vocational setting or if your needs cannot currently be met by other programmes offered locally.

It combines three elements:

- A sustained period of work experience and voluntary opportunities doing something you are interested in. This will help you build your CV and strengthen your employability skills.
- Education and training with the opportunity to gain further qualifications and employability skills.
- Leisure activities with the opportunity to meet and socialise with other students.



Looking Ahead: Employment and the Job Market

People with the skills and qualifications that businesses need are generally better paid and have more job options. Continuing in education and training helps you to develop skills, gain qualifications and get ready for the world of work. This includes going straight into an apprenticeship or job with training between the ages of 16 and 18. An apprenticeship is a job with training (see pages 14-17), which, which leads to a recognised qualification and often a clear route to progress a career. Any employer should support and encourage access to training.



The National Careers Service has developed a short quiz to help you to identify your interests, motivations and preferences. You can use this information to explore careers that might interest you in more detail. The quiz takes 5-10 minutes to complete: discover your skills and careers. You can also explore different careers to find out what a job involves and if it could be right for you: explore careers.

The Local Picture

In recent years, the number and types of jobs available in York have changed. You may know people who have changed role, the hours they work or their employer during this time. The importance of having digital skills has become considerably more important.

A key change is that more people now work from home, rather than going to an office. However, many roles still rely and thrive on people delivering a personal service such as in health & social care, education, retail, logistics and hospitality. Many science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) roles also require employees to use manufacturing, engineering and laboratory equipment at designated sites.

The jobs market in York remains competitive; as well as young people leaving school, college and university, more people are looking to change jobs or return to work. This means that personal qualities such as adaptability, a willingness to learn and resilience are more important than ever.

Whilst it's good to have a clear idea of next steps, you may have no firm career plans in Year II. So, now's the time for you to think about developing the transferable and technical skills that employers need. With the fast pace of change in business and industry today, you will need to put yourself in the best position to meet the needs of employers now and in the future.

Employers across all sectors value basic literacy, numeracy and digital skills, along with transferable skills such as self-management. In terms of key skills that employers are looking for, they can be broken down into two categories: baseline and specialist.

So, when deciding to live and work in York, you'll need to know about:

Local employers

York has some big employers in the city but most are small to medium sized companies (SMEs) with fewer than 250 employees. Self-employment and starting your own business are also real possibilities, but it's important for you to understand the sector you wish to operate within and who your customers will be.

Good Business Employers

In York, some employers are signed up to the Good Business Charter (GBC). This means they have committed to ten responsible business practices, which include paying the Real Living Wage, offering fair hours and contracts, to source products ethically and are committed to reducing their carbon usage.

Job Opportunities


Current predictions are that the biggest growth in job opportunities in York will be for those people whose qualifications are Level 3 or above, which is equivalent to A Levels, T Levels and applied general qualifications, diplomas or advanced apprenticeships. This means that those who continue to study or train beyond the age of 19 should be in a stronger position. This could be at a university or other higher education institution, through a higher/degree level apprenticeship, or by gaining professional qualifications while working.

Top Tips

The <u>National Careers Service</u> provides support on applying for jobs, preparing for interview, creating a CV and covering letter.

Some tips are listed below:

Have your information available when you start your application, for example qualifications/predicted grades, any work history and referees	Be punctual – allow enough time to get to your interview. If you don't know where to go, ask for directions in advance
Have a genuine interest in the position you are applying for	Pick out something suitable and comfortable to wear
Read the job description carefully and link your answers to the key elements of the job description	Turn your phone off
Do your research and demonstrate what you know about the company	Take a copy of your CV / application with you to remind yourself of what you said
Follow any instructions carefully	Sit up straight, keep calm and be yourself
Try to link in with your work experience, volunteering, leisure activities, clubs and school/college experiences	You can ask the interviewer to repeat a question – take your time to think before you answer.
Do not rush your application – make sure you do a spell check and proof read	Speak clearly
Have a sensible email address and include up to date contact details	Do not interrupt the interviewer

Think about including/attaching a covering letter with your application	Thank the person for the opportunity



Employment Sectors in York


York has a number of different employment sectors, which include a wide range of different jobs and occupations. Whilst each sector has its own specialist occupations (see the table below), businesses in all sectors need people who work in finance, IT, marketing, legal and other areas.

Whilst it is important to understand the job market in York, you might want to look further afield. Think about your chosen method of transport and the time it will take you to get there, rather than the distance.

Green jobs and green skills

You may have heard about 'green jobs' and 'green skills' but are uncertain what the difference is or how important they are for working in York.

A 'green job' is employment in an activity that contributes to our net zero emissions target and other environmental goals, such as nature restoration and mitigation against climate risks. Examples include renewable energy generation, woodland creation and flood defence

Did you know?

In York, we have an ambition to be a net zero carbon city by 2030. We all have a part to play and this includes developing green skills.

'Green skills' are needed in a variety of roles and across different sectors. Increasingly employers in York are looking for people with skills such as innovation, adaptability and resilience to help them make their business activities more environmentally friendly.

Technical green skills are also in demand in areas such as construction and transport. For instance, plumbers and electricians will need to know how to fit environmentally friendly 'air source heat pumps' and car mechanics will be needed to fix electric as well as petrol cars.

At the same time, new technologies continue to change the world around us and it's possible that the job you'll be doing in 20 years' time doesn't yet exist! So, like today's plumbers and car mechanics, you'll need to be prepared to learn new skills along the way.

Looking Ahead: Higher Education

Thinking about Higher Education?

You can progress to higher education (HE) with a range of qualifications, including A Levels, BTECs, diplomas, T Levels and apprenticeships.

Local universities and colleges support a range of activities to promote access to HE. Generally, total earnings over a lifetime are higher for those with HE qualifications and there are many other positive experiences and benefits to be gained from studying at a university or college. If you know the type of job you would like to do after studying, look at job adverts and applications to see if they ask for particular qualifications.

It is also possible to apply for deferred entry onto HE courses, which allows you to secure your place on a course whilst you gain valuable work experience or travel.

Studying in York

York has two universities (the University of York and York St John University) and two colleges (Askham Bryan College and York College). All institutions offer a wide range of HE courses, both academic and work-based, including degree-level apprenticeships and foundation degrees. Further afield, there are around 400 providers across the country offering over 50,000 courses (see UCAS details on pages 33 and 56), so there should be a course to meet your interest.

It is important to recognise that some courses ask for particular A Levels or other qualifications. Teachers and advisers at schools will be able to tell you which subjects may be useful when picking options for HE, alternatively visit ucas.com/explore or informedchoices. ac.uk. Information about entry requirements for courses is available through university and college prospectuses and websites.

Costs and financial support

Universities and other HE providers in England can charge up to £9,250 per year (in 2024). No fees are paid up front and fee and maintenance loans are available depending on your financial situation. You do not start repaying your loan until you are earning at least £25,000 per year. The rate of repayment is 9% of your earnings over £25,000 and loans are written off after 40 years, no matter how much you have paid off.

There is additional support available to you if you are care experienced and are looking to progress to higher education. This includes a bursary of £2,000 to help with the costs of books

and materials and there is also support to pay for accommodation costs. For more information: Care Leavers support for Higher Education.

Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA)

This is available to support HE students with a range of difficulties and conditions. Allowances and support available through DSA are tailored to individual needs through a personal DSA Needs Assessment. Assessments can be carried out locally to where you live or plan to study. There are two DSA Assessment Centres in York.

Sessions are delivered to you by specialist tutors in mechanics, construction and land-based learning; this includes access to a private woodland area and a range of small animals which live at our Elvington site. A small and experienced team of teachers provide maths, English, ICT and PSHE education to ensure you learn crucial life skills. For the young people that were entered for exams in the last academic year, we had a 75% exam pass rate. Our PSHE curriculum is enhanced by visits from the local fire service, mental health support groups and guest speakers such as the TV personality, Paul Cashmore.

Blueberry provides Personalised Learning Programmes in Preparation for Adulthood (PFA), supporting you to develop greater independence and employability. Personalised Learning PFA Programmes are usually for 2 years and include Functional Skills, Independent Living Skills, Employability Skills, Citizenship and Wellbeing and supported work experience. Programmes can also include sessions such as weekly visits to David Lloyd gym, bike maintenance, cycling, arts and crafts, woodwork, IT projects and participation in a wide range of activities in the local community.

Blueberry has "in-house" supported work experiences in the Pop Up Shop, Crafts Workshop, Community Enterprise and Garden Care Team. Blueberry works in partnership with local employers to offer work placements in a range of sectors including retail, catering, hospitality, administration and IT. You are supported by a job coach to work as independently as possible.

The Blueberry team aims to support you to plan for your future. You are encouraged to aspire to employment, maintain volunteering opportunities, be part of the local community and continue with a routine of healthy and positive social and leisure activities beyond education.

Blueberry also offers a range of Blueberry Social Clubs and activities for you when on programme.

You have an allocated Information, Advice and Guidance worker to help you achieve your goals and support personal development.

Some students progress to a 3rd year supported internship. This is a I year education programme with a clear goal of paid employment. You spend a minimum of 2 days a week with an employer and continue with Blueberry education for I or 2 days a week in Functional Skills and Employability. A Blueberry job coach provides you with support in the workplace.

Some students progress to Blueberry Supported Employment service, through Social Care, where you can continue to develop employability skills through work experience.

Routes 2 Success is a one-year programme for a minimum of 3 days per week. You will study English and maths as well as a City & Guilds qualification in Employability skills, getting you ready for the world of work.

There is a dedicated personal and social development curriculum to support you to develop your confidence and resilience as you move on into adulthood.

You will have the opportunity to participate in a work placement or work tasters which can be for one day a week or for shorter periods to meet your needs. Classroom study is in small groups with a variety of projects and enrichment activities to equip you for independence and to engage and motivate you to succeed. Additional support requirements which can be met through our dedicated learner support team.

York College (FE/HE college)

York College aims to ensure that if you have learning difficulties and/or disabilities you are able to enrol on your chosen course, from Entry Level to Level 3, including A Levels and T Levels; as well as higher education courses (if entry criteria is met).

The Pathways to Work and Independent Living course is ideal for students working at Entry Level 2, Entry Level 3 and Level I who may require a personalised approach to learning designed to meet individual needs. The programme is supported with a high ratio of staff to students and is delivered through a combination of theory, practical sessions, visits, speakers, and work placements. Each individual course lasts one year, and you may be entered for Entry 2, Entry 3, or Level I at the start of your time at college, depending on ability and prior achievements. You will study a range of units to develop skills that prepare you for both work and living independently.

We focus on helping you to prepare for adult life and develop the skills and confidence to achieve progression to other courses, Supported Internships and work. The programme also encourages you to develop personal, social and communication skills, offering an excellent opportunity to belong to a small, supportive group of students within the context of the wider college setting. You will study English and maths at a level suitable for your needs, including working towards an award where appropriate. Progression onto GCSE English and maths is available for some students which includes joining classes in the wider college community to access. You will also undertake a work placement one day a week for a term. This can be either supported I:I or undertaken with support from staff who visit you regularly.

The White Rose Building is off site provision based opposite the college. You will work towards a Level 2 Princes Trust qualification in personal development and for those at Level 3, an Extended Project qualification. This creates a high degree of personalisation and private study, allowing for a fully differentiated approach. You will be involved in community projects and retake GCSE English and maths if you haven't achieved a grade 4.

To access Level 3 provision, you must have achieved a grade 4 or above in English and maths. The White Rose Building provision is staffed by teachers delivering the learning programmes and acting as key workers. There are opportunities to create gradual exposure to post-16 settings during the year and to liaise with and support therapeutic interventions.

Preparing for Adulthood

The focus of our teams is to work with you and your parents/carers as you look towards your future. Teams include Specialist Learning & Employment Advisers, Social Workers from Adults and Children's Social Care, York Independent Living and Travel Skills (YILTS), SEN and colleagues in Children's and Adult Health.

Increasing independence, having access to friends and the community, being able to work and enjoying good health, is a life that everyone should be able to live.

Our teams work with colleagues across the Local Authority (LA) as well as within health and the voluntary sector and in our local communities to achieve this.

York Special Educational Needs Service

Information on what's available in York for you and your parents/carers if you have SEND or an EHCP.

Raise

Raise York is a new family hub website (previously known as YorOK). It is a network of people, places and online support. It supports you and your parents and carers with information from pregnancy to adulthood. You can expect a warm welcome in your local community and to be guided to the right support for you.

Scope

A free careers advice service for you if you are aged 15-25 in England and Wales and you are disabled or have an impairment or condition.



SENDIASS

Special Education Needs and Disability Information, Advice and Support Services (SENDIASS) provides information, advice and support to you and your parents/carers in relation to special educational needs and disability and related health and social care issues. The service is free and can be provided over the telephone, during home visits or through support at meetings.

SEN Co-ordination Team

SEN designated officers - the team who update, approve and administer the EHCP

Sport and Active Leisure

If you have a disability or additional needs, we can help you achieve your recommended 150 minutes of physical activity per week to boost your health and happiness. We offer a wide variety of sports and activities, including goalball, boccia, wheelchair basketball and cycling on adapted bikes.

York SEND Local Offer

This is a city-wide partnership approach to provide the local offer for York. It provides information for you and your parents/carers if you have special educational needs.



Leisure and Play

There are many leisure and community activities in York that you can take part in. For example there are sports and outdoor clubs and sessions, art and creative groups, youth clubs including an Inclusive Duke of Edinburgh group

Yiksaaa

Live Well York

As you move towards adulthood, this website has information on local leisure and social activities.

Local Area Coordinators

Local Area Coordinators help you stay safe, well, independent and connected to your local community by:

- helping raise awareness of available resources
- providing links to local services
- supporting people with a wide range of issues
- · developing resilience and social inclusion in communities

Local Area Coordinators work with individuals and families of all ages and abilities. They take time to get to know you, your family, friends, carers and your community, so they can help you to build a strong support network.



Financial Support

16-19 Bursary Fund and apprenticeship bursary for care leavers up to the age of 25

Depending on your family circumstances and what you choose to do, there may be extra financial support to help you continue in full-time education and other training programmes. You may need some financial support to help stay in publicly funded education or training after 16 through to the age of 19 and you can apply to your intended school sixth form, college or training provider for support from this fund:

- Those most in need could be eligible for a bursary of £1,200 a year. These include you if
 you are in care, you are a care leavers, you receive income support (or Universal Credit in
 your own name) and if you are disabled and receiving both Employment Support Allowance
 (or Universal Credit in your own right) and Disability Living Allowance (or Personal
 Independence Payment).
- A bursary of £3,000 is available to you if you are in care and/or are an eligible care leaver (up to the age of 25) if you start an apprenticeship. It is payable in instalments over the first year of your apprenticeship.
- Other students facing financial difficulties may also be able to apply for a bursary to help
 with costs of transport, equipment or other participation and/or course-related costs.
 Awards are made to individual students on a case-by-case basis according to assessed need
 and funding availability.

Your provider will decide how you get your bursary. You might be paid in full or in instalments, or more typically payments are made 'in kind' for travel passes, free meals and/or to pay for books. For more information visit **GOV.UK 16-19 bursary fund**.

Care to Learn

If you are the main parent or carer for your child and under 20 years old at the time you start your course, Care to Learn provides financial support (up to £180 per week per child) which can be used to help pay for childcare, place holding over summer and related travel costs while you remain in learning. Care to Learn is available for a variety of courses, full and part-time and is paid direct to the Ofsted registered childminder or nursery. Payments for your travel expenses are made to the education provider who will either reimburse you or make arrangements for your travel. More details on this scheme will be available from the intended school sixth form, college or training provider. For more information and to apply visit GOV.UK care to learn.

Higher Education bursary and support for care leavers

There is support available to you if you are care experienced and are looking to progress to higher education. This includes a bursary of £2,000 to help with the costs of books and materials and there is also support to pay for accommodation costs. For more information on the full offer visit <u>Care Leavers support for Higher Education</u>.

Child Benefit and Child Tax Credits

If you continue in education, your parents/carers should be able to continue claiming Child Benefit and any Child Tax Credits that they are entitled to until you turn 20. If you leave education but return before your 19th birthday, they can start claiming again until you turn 20. If you are already 19, you need to have either started the course or been enrolled or accepted on it by your 19th birthday. For more information visit GOV.UK child benefit and GOV.UK child tax credit. Household/parental benefits may be affected if you take up employment, including an apprenticeship.

The financial support that is available to parents and carers to help with the cost of childcare is increasing. These include major changes to make it easier for parents and carers with childcare responsibilities to move into or take on more paid work. Starting from April 2024, existing childcare support will be expanded in phases. By, September 2025, working parents with children aged 9 months old to when they start school will be eligible for 30 hours childcare support.

Help with transport

There are various schemes to help with the cost of your transport to college or sixth form, provided certain conditions are met.

If your family is on a low income and you live over three miles from the institution, you may be entitled to a free bus pass. You may also apply for assistance as an independent student without regard to parent/carers' income according to set criteria. Students with any special needs that require assistance with transport will be assessed on an individual basis. For full information visit <u>Transport to school or college</u>. Individual institutions may also be able to provide help with transport. See their websites and literature for further information.

Help with transport if you have an EHCP

If you have an EHCP you may be entitled to further support with travel such as a place in a taxi or a Personal Travel Budget. You will need to visit **York School**Transport for details of how to apply and you will need to apply for each year you remain in education.

York Independent Living and Travel Skills (YILTS) offers travel training and can assess your travel skills if you are aged 11-25 years old and currently access City of York Council funded transport.

YILTS supports you to understand timetables, plan routes, become familiar with being out and about, and understand what to do if something unexpected happens. You may be asked to undergo a practical assessment to determine your longer term need for transport support.



YILTS also receive referrals from a range of professionals, parents and young people. Training is provided at a time that is right for you and YILTS staff attend EHCP meetings in school to help agree travel plans, e.g. as you move on from school or college.

Free meals

The free meals entitlement covers school sixth forms, colleges and some other post-16 provision. To be eligible, a young person needs to have an EHCP, or meet criteria relating to receipt of benefits. Please speak to your school, college or training provider for further details.
