Options choices- Background & context

The Department for Education (DofE) tells schools how they must make up the curriculum pupils receive. The aim is to provide all pupils across the country with a **broad and balanced curriculum** with schools taking a similar quantity of qualifications. There are a **number of core subjects that are compulsory** to all schools.





Compulsory subjects are:

- GCSE Mathematics
- GCSE English (Language & Literature)*
- GCSE Science (Combined or Separate)*

Non-examined Core subjects:

- Worldview & Modern Issues
- Core PE & IAG including careers support



Students will take between 8 to 10 qualifications to examination



GCSE's:

Tend to be more traditional subjects

Exam assessed, small (if any) coursework element

Awarded a 9 to 1 grade

Non GCSE's: eg: Cambridge National awards

These are more vocational (employment orientated)

Tend to be more practical subjects

Have a greater coursework emphasis

Graded Distinction* to pass (at Level 1 & 2)

Both have equal status/value

Government guidance:

Securing the best outcomes for all pupils

The Department for Education make

a very strong recommendation about the other subjects a pupil should study up to the age of 16.

At Vale of York we recognise the importance of students achieving the best possible outcomes, so that they are well placed to continue with their chosen educational pathway.

So we are making it compulsory for students to select at least one EBacc subject.

EBacc subjects are:

- GCSE Geography
- GCSE History
- GCSE German
- GCSE French
- GCSE Computer Science
- GCSE Separate Sciences (Bio/Chem/Phys)

HELP YOUR CHILD MAKE THE BEST GCSE CHOICES

You and your child may currently be considering, with advice from their school, what GCSE subjects they should take next year.

The Department for Education recommends these core subjects, which make up the English Baccalaureste (EBacc), and help keep options for young people open:

- English language and English literature
- Matha
- Science Continued science or 3 single sciences from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and Computer science
- History or Geography
- A language

WHAT IS THE EBACC?

The EBacc is not a qualification in its own right - it's a combination of GCSE subjects, including a language, that offer an important range of knowledge and skills to young people.

EBACC FUTURE PROOFS YOUR CHILD'S PROSPECTS

While your child may not have decided on their future career path yet, choosing the EBlaco at GCSE gives them access to a full range of employment options when they leave secondary school and the broad knowledge that employers are looking to:

If they are thinking of going to university, the EBacc is also recommended by Britain's most prestigious universities.

If your child can take 9 CoESs, they will have either 1 or 2 further options and can choose subjects based on their wider inferents like art or music as well as others such as physical education or technology.

Schools where more pupils select the EBacc at GCSE maintain the number of pupils that select arts.



Options – Key benchmark measures



English Baccalaureate (EBacc)

This is an ever increasingly important measure for pupils. The EBacc measure is designed to demonstrate pupil performance across a range of academic subjects. It indicates that they have achieved GCSE grades in:

English, Mathematics and at least two Sciences*, one humanity based subject and one modern foreign language.



NB-pupils will also achieve GCSE's in other subjects

Progress/Attainment 8

This measure is to ensure that pupils at KS4 cover a broad and balanced curriculum.

Students will select courses to ensure that they meet the following subjects:

English, Mathematics, two Sciences, at least one other EBacc subject and at least three other qualifications (these maybe EBacc).







Vale of York Academy - Option Choices 2024

As outlined in the Vale of York 2024 options booklet your child will receive a strong recommendation from the Academy to follow one of four pathways. This recommendation is based upon historic academic performance, current progress and appropriateness of course selection to enable the best opportunities for your child post 16.

It is our strong recommendation that your child follows the ENHANCED PATHWAY

This means that your child will achieve the Ebacc suite of qualifications, recognised at Post16 and beyond.

How to complete your child's option selection:

Using the information below make your choices on the google form link above

- 1. From Grid A (EBacc) select an MFL subject from line 1 and a humanity subject from line 2.
- Then make your 'priority' selection. This is the subject you wish to do more than any other from Grid B, without duplicating a selection already made from Grid A.
- Finally make ALL three additional 'preference' selections; once again from Grid B not duplicating a previous selection.
 Please do not leave any preference selections empty.

Timeline for the 2024 Options



Options 2024 - Timeline		
January	The process starts via reference to the option process in assemblies and lessons. Pupils can seek support and guidance from their form tutor and or subject teachers.	
Tue 23rd January	Year 9 options taster morning. All pupils will get an insight to Ebaac subjects and some of the courses not studied in KS3.	
Jan/Feb	Year 9 pupils will sit their Spring term assessment in every subject.	
Tue 6th February	Options information evening. All parents and carers of year 9 pupils are invited to attend this event where families will receive all the necessary information about the options process and their option booklet.	
Tue 20th February	Year 9 Parents evening - Online	
21st - 28th February	Submission window for option choice. Families will receive their personalised Google Form option letter via email, sent after parent evening on the night before. Families have one week to complete and submit.	
Wed 28th February	Deadline for the completion of the google form with your child's option choices.	
Easter to June	Processing and resolving of matters arising from pupils' choices.	
Late June	All pupils are informed of their option choices by letter.

Making the right subject choices can be difficult...

Based upon your child's performance in school we have made a strong recommendation as to the 'Pathway' best suited to them and ensuring the best outcomes for them.



The Option Pathways - EXPLAINED!

The Enhanced pathway secures the EBacc qualification.

- Initially you select your Modern Foreign Language and a Humanity choice thereby qualifying for the EBacc award.
- Then you select FOUR further subjects of which you will end up studying TWO of them.

Options choices Pupils with a second language



Any pupil who can meet the entry requirements of another GCSE Modern Foreign Language can use this language to be EBacc compliant and therefore be:



- either be a dual linguist
- or not follow the Enhanced pathway

(Entry requirements:

In summary write, read and speak an additional language, and commit to preparing for GCSE exams in their own time. Subjects inc: Spanish/Turkish/Polish/ Mandarin/Urdu/Arabic/ Russian/Greek)

The Option Pathways - IMPORTANT



The Supported pathway secures the progress 8 measure.

- You are automatically placed into Study+ (additional Maths, English & Science lesson and access to the AQA unit award).
- You select your one EBacc subject.
- Then you select FOUR further subjects of which you will end up studying TWO of them.

Priority & Preference selections



Pupils will be required to make **One** PRIORITY SELECTION.

This is the one subject you wish to do more than any other. I will always endeavour to **GUARANTEE** this subject.

There are 16 subjects available to choose

Will my child get their choices?



We will endeavour to give all pupils their intended choices, however due to the sheer number of permutations **we cannot guarantee** it. Hence why we ask for a **priority** and then several **preferences**.

For the majority of students the submission of their form will be the end of the matter until you receive confirmation of your options in the Summer term.

However, if there any issues or concerns the school (me) will be in contact as soon as possible seeking to find the right solution for your child.



Can my child change their choices?



It is absolutely essential that the selection of choices that are put down on the options form as the subject you are prepared to study in September.

There is a very short window at the start of each course where (if possible) some pupils can adapt their choices. After that changes are very rarely considered.

It is always a better option to get it right from the beginning, so please take your time and make selections wisely!

Advice and Guidance on making your option choices







Which subjects do YOU enjoy?

- Do not base your choices solely on a subject teacher.
- Do not base your choices on your friends.

Consider workload. ALL subjects are hard! All require work out of the classroom, so it is important you enjoy them and are interested.

If you've no clear plans, keep options as open as possible.

Supporting your child What to think about...



It is highly recommended that both parent/guardian and pupil:

- · Talk to teachers about student potential within a subject at parents' evening.
- Read and analyse previous report grades.
- Explore subject specific details and requirements of possible final subject choices.
- Research and consider next steps. Will these choices enable possible post 16 or career opportunities?
- · Speak to older students currently studying the courses.

There are no "soft" or "easy" options It is an unavoidable fact that ... GCSE's are hard work!!



IN SUMMARY: Our best advice to making your option choices is...

- Choose subjects you enjoy studying because of the content and not because of the teacher who maybe teaching it.
- Don't be influenced by what your peers are doing.
- Choose subjects that you look forward to because you will have spend a lot of time out of the classroom extending learning.
- Choose subjects that will allow you to keep as many options open or relate to a specific career choice you have in mind.
