CURRICULUM STATEMENT

At KS3: Students will study a range of genres, styles, practitioners and scripts. Throughout each year they will develop their skills in devising from a variety of stimulus materials as well as exploring scripts. They will learn how to work as a group, work to time and meet specific requirements through rehearsal. The KS3 curriculum is a mini version of KS4, this will give students experience of all areas of the GCSE and engage their love for drama. As there is no NC for drama, planning has taken place incorporating many different areas and skills needed for the wider world as well as GCSE criteria.

At KS4: Drama is an exciting, creative and challenging course allowing students to learn how to explore performance. The course helps students develop skills in empathy, speaking, listening, presentation skills and developing confidence. Students follow the AQA GCSE drama where they will focus on devising, scripted drama as well as knowledge and understanding of how theatre is created and performed.

Curriculum framework	AQA GCSE drama. Three components to the course: 1. Understanding drama - Written Exam This knowledge is assessed through a written exam taken in Y11. The exam is 1 hour and 45 minutes and worth 80 marks which is 40% of their GCSE.	



	 2. Devising drama Practical and Coursework There are 80 marks for this component, 60 marks for a Devising Log and 20 marks for their Devised Performance. This component is worth 40% of their GCSE. 3. Texts in practice Students are asked to study, select and perform two extracts from one play. There are 40 marks for this component, 20 for each extract. This will make up 20% of their final GCSE.

CURRICULUM IMPLEMENTATION

As an Academy we have a range of clear standards and expectations of our pupils however each subject area has its own individual practices and habits that ensure that it can function to its optimum.

Curriculum delivery:

There are no set groups for drama so students with a wide range of abilities are part of all lessons. Each lesson starts with a warm up game to work on key skills needed for that lesson, followed by key questions, planning and rehearsal time. Students are encouraged to perform in front of their class most weeks. Performing can be daunting but the aim is to help students develop their confidence and be prepared for putting themselves out there for job interviews and presentations in the work place.

Homework:

KS3 - There is no formal Homework for drama. Students are encouraged to continue their learning beyond the classroom through their creative thinking, planning and progressing their ideas.

KS4 - At KS4 students are expected to be developing their characters, finding short scripts and monologues, practising exam questions and reading plays. In Y11, students are expected to organise their own rehearsals and work on their coursework in their own time.
